Volunteer Coordinator— As an organization that operates strictly through the work of volunteers, we are so grateful for those that chose to show up again and again to support Habitat and our homebuyers. **Church Relations**—This past year, energy was spent in trying to gather the email and phone contacts of the 50+ faith communities just in Kearney. There were several visits that were made to local congregations and clubs, sharing a 5–8-minute presentation on Kearney Area Habitat history.

We also had a Tuesday gathering meant to bring together the clergy and church workers at the Habitat worksite this summer. Although we had only 8 present, there was good discussion and connections made.

One exciting new project for the 2023 year is to develop (with the help and expertise of homeowner Elle Zimniak) a 'commercial' series about the work of Habitat for local congregations that can be used in worship settings or on Facebook.

Family Selection— In the past year there were 90 contacts from various sources routed to the Family Selection Committee. These inquiries were questions regarding the process of purchasing a Habitat home as well as several inquiries for home repairs, immediate housing and other concerns.

Approximately 80% of our inquiries are from our website and email. The remainder are by telephone. Forty six credit reports were obtained from potential applicants in 21-22. From this group 16 full applications were sent out. We had three closings in 2022.

Currently we have two applicants that are approved to start construction in 2023 with one pending approval (now done). We are also seeking applicants for the 2024 build season and hope to have three applicants approved by November.

The FSC members include: Kati Osterbuhr, Bill Wright, Patrick Waltemath, Marshall Everitt and Julie Adams. This has been a team effort this year as we have had some changes in the committee from 2022. Emily Ridgeway who has been serving as our affiliate's loans qualified loan originator (QLO) has been replaced by Daniel Leathers (QLO).

I want to thank all the committee members who have served on this committee. Your dedication to KAHfH is greatly appreciated.

Families are our Priority Kathy Everitt

Family Support—The Family Support Committee had a year of growth. We expanded our committee to four people and divided up the responsibilities. Our committee work was a group effort and provided more points of contact for the families and support partners.

Our committee organized the homeowner manual meeting, the financial classes, the lawn care meetings and finally the collection of sweat equity hours throughout the build season. We also help find support partners for each of the homeowner families. These support partners come from the Kearney community and help work on the build site, attend meetings with the homeowners and also pray with and for the homeowners during the process. We would especially like to thank Melissa Ott, Rebecca Hermance, and Allen Krohn for their time and work with the Habitat homeowners this year.

Our homeowners, their support partners and their family and friends completed a total of 1,550 sweat equity hours for the 2022 build season. That is 350 hours over the required amount..


We look forward to working with the new families and support partners for 2023.

More bushes will be added in the spring to the lot line south of the new development to fill in the gaps of lost bushes. The 2023 homes will be laid out on Avenue P with room for an additional 6 homes there.

Fundraising Committee— We have four committee members: Blaine Drozd, Mel Wiens, Drew Wagner and Margaret Messbarger who have worked to communicate with our donors, apply for grants and plan for the future.

With immense gratitude, we'll highlight some of the funding that provides the backbone of this ministry. Our Carpenter's Club members are individuals who give annually providing funding for each home that is built. Some of these Club members have given annually to this ministry for the entire 30 years that our affiliate has existed. Our Carpenter's Club members provided 28 percent of our funding this past year.

Several churches regularly take up collections to support Habitat. Some of these churches have given monthly to this ministry for the entire thirty years that our affiliate has existed, and I want to say a special thank you to those churches for their unwavering support, as they are a strong backbone of this ministry. The churches that have sustained this ministry this past year are St. James Catholic Church, First United Methodist Church, Thrivent Ministry, First Lutheran Church, First Church of God, First Presbyterian church and the Newman Center Apostolate. We are very grateful for the continuous support these churches provide. These churches provided 18 percent of the of our funding this past year.

Several Foundations provided grants to help fund the cost of building homes this past year. Those grants came from Wells Fargo, First National Bank, Parker-Hannifin Employee Grants and Bank of the West. We also received a donation from the SpartanNash Foundation through our area Family Fresh grocery stores collections. Other local businesses also give to our ministry and we are very grateful for their support. These grants and business donations provided 34 percent of our funding this past year.

This past year, hundreds of individuals have donated to this ministry either directly, as memorials or through the *Give Where You Live* community campaign. These individual donations provided 20 percent of our funding this past year.

The fundraising committee submits our report in gratitude for all those who support this ministry.

Wilcox Scholarship Committee— Through the generosity of a former dedicated Habitat supporter Elane Wilcox, scholarships are available for the homeowners and their families. Elane was the first Hospitality Chairman for KAHfH,

When Elane passed away in 2010 she bequeathed money to the KAHfH organization to use at their discretion. Because of her love of education and the fact that she had been a teacher, the Board decided to take part of this money to use for scholarships for the homeowners and their families who have indicated an interest in furthering their education. Since the Fall of 2013, seventy-five scholarships totaling \$37,199 have helped over 20 homeowners and their families with furthering their educational goals. Recipients have used this scholarship money to attend various schools of higher education such as UNK, UNO, Central CC in Kearney, Hastings and McCook, Joseph School of Beauty and Southeast Community College to name a few. One homeowner used the scholarship money to take ESL classes to improve her English so she would be better prepared to find employment.

KAHfH hopes to continue to be able to assist our homeowners and their families in improving their lives by furthering their education.
