Jerry has been far too busy to worry about a newsletter article so I would like to share some of the remarks he made on June 1st at the Groundbreaking Ceremony for the 100th House. (Taken from Mary Jane Skala's Hub article)

Jerry Marlatt, who has been Habitat's building superintendent since its founding, told attendees that the Habitat founders wondered whether sufficient money, supplies and volunteers would always be available. "It came down to "just trust in the Lord," he said. He also said many Habitat for Humanity affiliates across the country have paid administrators, but not here. "We have no paid staff. People here help because they want to. All of us are volunteers." he said.

As I watched my video of the entire event some other things stood out. When Ken Mumm asked if anyone present had been on site for all 100 houses, Jerry raised his hand. (There were at least 8 others too) He continually emphasized that KAHfH is based on volunteers and the area businesses and organizations that donate time and goods. He said, "This is not the end, we have lots of lots to build on." (You will see a report on that elsewhere)

After all the speakers remarks, they and a lot of other special people were invited to pick up a shovel. Not some gold Chamber shovel but ones from the work trailer. <u>Jerry used the one that he used for that first house</u>. At that time all the footings were dug by hand. Here is a picture of that shovel.

Again this year our committee was charged with running the financial classes for the 2024 home buyers. Last vear we pivoted from the Dave Ramsev Financial Peace classes to the Fannie Mae Homeownership classes. We will follow the Fannie Mae framework and will hold three classes during the build season to help build community, improve budgeting practices, and increase knowledge about being a homeowner.

In addition to the financial classes, our committee also organized the homebuyer manual meeting at the beginning of the build season and will have a lawn care meeting near the end of the season with the help of other Habitat volunteers and committees.

We would like to thank the Kearney community members who volunteered their time to serve as support partners for the 2024 homebuyers: Deb Fox (Katelyn Fox), Melissa Hansen & daughter Kelsie (Shelbie Luethke), Michaela Marcy, Janette & Todd Marcy (Logan Rutan)

These support partners help work on the build site to donate sweat equity hours, attend meetings with the homeowners and also pray with and for the homeowners during the entire process. We appreciate all of the help and support they each geve during the year.

Finally, our committee keeps a record of the sweat equity hours during the build season. Each homebuyer has to complete 400 hours before receiving the keys to their home. Last year our homeowners, their support partners, and their family and friends completed a total of 1,300 sweat equity hours for the 2023 build season. That is 100 hours over the required amount of sweat equity hours!


We look forward to continue working with the new families and support partners for the 2024 build season and to see how many hours these awesome people will complete..

### Site Development Committee— Mike Mertz

KAHfH is currently working with Miller and Associates and the city of Kearney in planning the Marlatt Fourth Addition. This property is located north of the existing build site. (shown at the top of this map) 18<sup>th</sup> street would be extended through this area east of Avenue N.

A City of Kearney DRT meeting is planned in June of 2024 to reviewed the proposed layout. 25 to 28 lots are planned for this location, which will be developed in three phases. Phase one will be the development of 8 lots, phase two has 11 lots, and phase three has about 9 lots. It is hoped that the footings for the third home of 2025 will be completed in this new location in late October 2024.

The water and sewer infrastructure is tentatively scheduled to start in December 2024 with street paving to begin in the Spring of 2025. We will have a better idea of dates after the DRT meeting and city council meetings are complete. In the meantime there are two additional lots in the exiting addition which will be developed for houses one and two of 2025.



This spring Ken Mumm worked with several partners including the Nebraska State Arboretum in sourcing trees and plants. In May 2024, KAHfH volunteers and a crew from Rowe Sanctuary worked with homeowners to plant trees and native plants in yards and around the Marlatt sign at the entrance of the subdivision. A big thanks to all involved.

### Wilcox Scholarship Committee— Judy Fisher

The Kearney Area Habitat for Humanity offers scholarships for homeowner and their families through the generosity of Elane Wilcox, who was a former Habitat supporter. She was the first Hospitality Chairman for KAHfH. Elane passed in 2010 and at that time, she donated money to the KAHfH organization to use at their discretion. She had a great love of education and had also been a teacher so the KAHfH Board decided to use part of this money for scholarships for the Kearney Area Habitat homeowners and their families who indicate an interest in furthering their education.

Since the Fall of 2013, 79 scholarships totaling \$39,199 have helped approximately 25 homeowners and their families in furthering their educational goals. These families have used this scholarship money to attend various schools of higher education such as the University of Nebraska at Kearney, at Lincoln, and at Omaha. Also, some have attended CCC in Kearney, Hastings, and McCook Joseph School of Beauty, Southeast Community College. Scholarship money has been used to take ESL classes which better prepared them to find employment. Kearney Area Habitat for Humanity hopes to continue to be able to assist the homeowners and their families in improving their lives through furthering their education.

Anyone who wishes to donate to the Scholarship Fund may do so by sending his or her donation to the Kearney Area Habitat for Humanity with that designation noted.
